

U-Prep Students Culture Trips in China - by Dr. Biao Cheng, Mandarin Teacher One of U-Prep's Student Learning Outcomes (SLO), which articulate the values of the school community, stipulates that a U-Prep student will be: A Positive Member of a Diverse Society -- Able to demonstrate compassion and empathy throughout the community, both locally and globally. To prepare our students to become future global citizens who serve local but think global, the Chinese language program (known as Confucius Classroom at U-Prep since 2013) has made consistent efforts over the past 10 years in promoting a culture of understanding and appreciation through cultural trips to China.

To date, we have organized five trips to China in the summers of 2007, 2008, 2011, 2014 and 2015, respectively. Through federal grants, international exchange programs and sponsorships from Confucius Institute, we've helped over 80 students receive sufficient funds to go to China. On these trips, we visited more than 20 cities in over half of China's 32 provinces. While enjoying the beautiful scenery of China, our students conducted meaningful exchange activities with their Chinese counterparts; by shadowing Chinese students at school and staying in student's families, U-Prep students have experienced the school and family life of Chinese students firsthand.

During the summer of 2015, twelve high school students visited China for 4 weeks. With the cosponsorships from our Confucius Classroom at U-Prep and Confucius Institute at San Francisco State University, the total cost per student was reduced to about \$1,400 for the entire 4 weeks including the international airfare. A salient feature that distinguishes this year's trip is that in the first 2 weeks, we provided volunteer service by organizing 2 English summer camps for local students in 2 cities -- Zhengzhou, Henan and Dingxi, Gansu. Dingxi is one of the 50 counties designated by the central government of China as the most poverty -stricken areas of the country. In the camps, our students hosted sessions like "How to say it in American English", "Learn English words in a real situation", and "American Culture Q & A". More than 200 students from Zhengzhou No. 9 High School and Dingxi No. 1 High School attended the camps. For many students of Dingxi, it is the first time they have spoken to a native speaker of English. Our students were warmly received by the Chinese schools and the feedback from students about the camps were overwhelmingly favorable.

In the second 2 weeks, our students attended a Chinese culture summer camp organized by Hanban, the Confucius Institute Headquarters in Beijing. Our students visited Beijing, Zhengzhou, Luoyang, Kaifeng and Dengfeng. They learned Chinese Martial Arts, traditional painting and calligraphy. While abroad, students stayed with the host families and enjoyed the face-to-face in-depth interactions with Chinese families. The warm hospitality from the Chinese students and families deeply touched the heart of our students. The combination of volunteer service and cultural experience not only benefited students' personal growth, but would also prove instrumental to their future college applications.

Sociolinguists all agree that language is a carrier of shared meanings (culture). The ultimate goal of learning a language is to be able to appreciate the culture the language carries. The process of acquiring a language, therefore, should also be simultaneously a process of absorbing varied aspects of the target culture. While it is difficult to understand the subtle nuances and deep meanings of another culture without knowing its language well, it is impossible to learn any language without the knowledge of the culture. The culture trips to China in the past 10 years have witnessed an enhanced cultural sensitivity and understanding of U-Prep students, as well as their deeper appreciation for their parents after seeing with their own eyes the hard living conditions of students in some parts of China.

Confucius Classroom at U-Prep will continue to make efforts to help prepare U-Prep students to become a positive member of a diverse society and a qualified global citizen with broad international perspectives. Culture trips to China have proven to be an effective way to help our students reach that goal.

WORLD LANGUAGES CLUB

June 2014 saw nine seniors and juniors travel to Epernay, France. You may not have heard of the town, but you know its most famous export – champagne. It's a town steeped in history; the rolling hills surrounding it are now covered in vine-yards, but were once the scene of important World War battles.

Each of our U-Prep students stayed for five days with a French teenager and their family, joining in with everyday life and on the fifth day, accompanying them to school. They gained insights into French life and culture and took advantage of the opportunity to speak French in real-life situations.

After a short train ride back to Paris, our students began an action-packed three day exploration of the city—made more adventurous by the fact that a transportation strike had begun just that day; we had to find our way to scheduled tours of the Louvre, Eiffel Tower and other sites using a third of the usually time-tabled buses and metro trains. Traveling complications aside, students loved the tours, yet also really appreciated the opportunity to explore various sections of the city on foot, in groups. They walked a lot, ate a lot of French specialties, and spoke a lot of French.

Many of the friendships made during those few days persisted through the following year; students kept in touch with their host families, gaining communication practice via Facebook. Because of positive experiences like these, it is recommended that all students expand their horizons and travel to Europe.

CULTURAL CONNECTIONS CLUB

The U-Prep Cultural Connections club has had the amazing opportunity to travel abroad in order to experience different cultures, interact with history in a more vivid way, and to participate in community service projects. In 2013, students traveled to Thailand on a spectacular adventure; they fished in the ocean, planted mangrove forests devastated by the tsunami of 2006 and worked in an orphanage for two days teaching children English. They hiked in the jungle, rafted down the river on bamboo rafts and experienced the night market at Chang Mi. Most returned to America with a completely new perspective and said this experience was life changing. Last year, we traveled to Peru. Not only did the students experience some of South America's most interesting historical cities like Lima and Cuzco, but hiked the terraces of Machu Picchu while learning about the impressive civilizations in that area. Students enjoyed firsthand demonstrations of weaving, fed llamas at a preserve, and visited an ancient salt mine. The highlight of this trip was working with the children in one of the village schools, teaching them English and learning about their culture; U-Prep students will cherish these memories for a lifetime! This year, Cultural Connections Club and World Languages Club are combining efforts for this year's venture to France and Spain. The trip starts in Paris, then moves to the French countryside before making its way to Barcelona. Shared camaraderie and bonding are the cornerstones of the experience. This is an amazing opportunity for U-Prep students to interact with two different European cultures, practice the languages, and to deepen their understanding of spectacular amounts of world history. Students will be participating in a community service project in the countryside of France that will allow them to have a broader understanding of this culture and to serve in a meaningful way.

While some enjoyed a bit of shopping, a majority of the students were drawn to the expansive Lithia Park. With manicured lawns, a duck pond, a rock-strewn stream, beautiful bridges and a playground, the park was a delightful attraction for the students. After a morning of exploration, the group attended an illuminating Prologue which introduced the main plots and subtle themes of the afternoon's performance. With such a great day behind them, many students wondered if the play, Much Ado About *Nothing*, would be able to maintain their interest. What our group experienced was a performance that was inspired, costumes that were fabulous, a set that was remarkable, and a work of art that was breathtaking.

HONDURAS EXPEDITION THROUGH THE EYES OF A STUDENT

On June 15, 2015, I embarked on an expedition to Honduras that opened my eyes to the reallife, interactive side of science. In the classroom, it could be hard to fully realize the significance of what we were learning when we were reading it out of a textbook. Out in the jungle, science came alive. I was able to immerse myself completely and see the importance of my work first-hand by scrambling on vertical slopes measuring trees to calculate carbon content, and wading through the river at night catching frogs to swab for the deadly amphibian-killing fungus, Chytrid. Everything we did was centered around helping global conservation research, and ultimately, the planet. To be able to contribute to that as a mere high school student was an inspiring experience. Stewardship opportunity aside, we also just had an incredibly fun time. We caught birds, set rodent traps, trekked through miles of dense jungle, ascended the canopy, explored coral paradises, and met knowledgeable and enthusiastic scientists from around the world. I was truly lucky to have experienced a trip such as Honduras.

PATRICK'S POINT 2015

Each year, the freshman class travels to Patrick's Point for an adventure in team building, beachcombing, and wildlife explorations. Woven into the itinerary is an initial visit to Humboldt State University, where a tour is conducted sharing the various programs offered. For many of the students, this was the first time visiting a university campus or getting a glimpse into college life. Following the HSU visit, students arrived at Patrick's Point ready to set up camp and get settled in for the evening. Raccoons and banana slugs roused some of the students to attention and humor, which only added to the memories of this year's trip. The following day, with a good night's rest behind them, the students made an early morning hiking trek around the park. Science skills were employed by classifying tide pool organisms; the main attraction was a 4-foot long octopus. The exploration of Agate Beach was another highlight and left an indelible impression regarding the windy, cold northern California coastline. Following the long hike to and from the Agate beach area, students were ready for food and rest. The next day, tents were put away and belongings packed. The trip home included much chatter about the great memories and experiences made by the wonderful Class of 2019. Thank you to the U-Prep staff (Mr. Nichols, Mrs. Kramer, Mrs. Gina Johnson, Mrs. Ampi, Mr. Baker, Mr. Lefler) and the parents who supported our students throughout the trip!

Serving Local, Thinking Global

On Saturday, October 3rd, a number of University Preparatory School students and staff took part in the City of Redding's annual Community Creek Clean-Up. Below is an excerpt written by community member Randall Smith regarding the day's events:

To write that this year's 10th Annual CCCU event was a huge success would be a serious understatement. Hundreds of volunteers including City Park staff, using everything from their hands to seven giant chipping machines, restored a riparian savanna along the Sacramento River which had been missing since the building of Shasta Dam. Many community groups and individuals numbering over five hundred reclaimed in four hours what decades of nonnative plant intrusion had encumbered along the North Sacramento River Trail from Carter Creek to Harlan Drive.

At least three generations of workers, many wearing shirts of their respective community origins, converged on the project area and never issued a word of complaint or disharmony. These volunteers gave a lasting gift to users of this popular trail and the City. Besides access to the River, fire danger reduction, and restoration of a healthy natural ecology, trail users can now visit a long river margin of native azalea formerly lost in the tangle of unwanted vegetation.

Thank you to everyone who came and gave their time and effort. This was the best so far and showed Redding's sincere devotion to its open spaces.

Simpson University Visits U-Prep

On Monday, October 5th, Professor Dan Pinkston and three of his Simpson University music department students (Abigail, Ashlynn, and Hannah) gave a brief presentation and performance on Colonial Era music. Mr. Pinkston began the presentation speaking of the reasons why music was in such shambles in the colonies. He also explained the importance of William Billings and other traveling singing teachers in improving American music. The students then performed one of Billing's most famous colonial song's, "When Jesus Wept". The presentation began with a solo by one of the students and continued on to a canon (a round) including all three singers. The entire 8th grade was captivated by the singers and presentation. The event concluded with a question and answer session. We can proudly boast that our students had thoughtful and articulate questions for Dr. Pinkston.

FRESHMEN ATTEND IGNITE OPPORTUNITY ~ STEM CAREER DAY

For the second consecutive school year, U-Prep sent a contingent of its freshmen to Shasta County's *Ignite Opportunity* day, emphasizing career and educational opportunities through STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math). The event was so well received and so well attended by local and regional employers, non-profits, government agencies, and schools, that the event was opened up to *all* Shasta County freshmen this year. U-Prep seized this opportunity, and brought the entire freshman class to a day of interactive displays, engaging workshops, and eye-opening opportunities at the Shasta District Fairgrounds in Anderson.

During the day U-Prep's freshmen – **the largest contingent of students of any of the 26 schools present** – were able to peruse the booths of companies such as CH2M Hill, Sierra Pacific, and Water Works Engineers, Shasta Regional and Mercy Medical Centers, government agencies ranging from public health, CalTrans, Conservation Corps, Fish and Wildlife, and more; as well as a dozen colleges and universities highlighting educational connections for their newfound aspirations.

The day also included a "STEM engineering challenge," wherein students used a sheet of paper, paper clips, and painter's tape to design an object that would soar as far as possible when dropped from a height of 20 inches.

Lunchtime on the green outside the exhibitor booths included a fly-in by a CHP helicopter. Booths were very interactive and hands-on, giving the 9th graders a glimpse into some local possibilities, but also giving them the opportunity to plan the rest of high school to help steer them in a direction they would like to go. While everyone learned so much at the event, many were given new insight into careers and opportunities that they didn't previously know existed.



In June of 2015 students, faculty and chaperones traveled to **Costa Rica** where they had an opportunity to connect with a new culture through service and experience. The students were able to help with the replanting of a rain forest, volunteer in a local school, and shared in local traditions. Students crushed sugar cane, and were taught to make Costa Rican food. They hiked through the rain forest and visited Paos Volcano and Aernal National Park, where they admired the geological wonders—not to mention the wonderful treat of watching a sloth navigate his travels. 

The months of November and December are shaping up to be quite






ATTENTION JUNIOR STUDENTS




