The U-Prep girls varsity soccer team earned their titles and enjoyed a season for the history books! While the team competes in the Northern Section Division 2 playoffs, they prepared themselves for a deep playoff run by competing against many of the best Division 1 teams in our area throughout their pre-season schedule. The Lady Panthers earned upper-division victories over Pleasant Valley, Chico, Foothill, and Enterprise this season, to name a few. The end of this season proved to be a celebration of titles, including Northern Athletic League Champions (10-0), Northern Section DII Champions (27-0) and Northern Regional CIF DV finalist, ending with a 29-1 record. The Regional Final saw the girls put up a great fight against Lowell HS in San Francisco, a school of over 2,600 students and the defending CIF DIV champion. The 2018-2019 team will say farewell to five seniors who have won three league titles and four section championships; Eila C., Ashton N., Kendall N., Alexis H. and Theresa J. The future continues to look bright knowing that there are four juniors, four sophomores and seven freshmen this season who have contributed to the success of this team and are excited to carry on the standard of excellence that is U-Prep Soccer. The team was recognized with four individual awards of All-League players and the MVP. Junior, Savannah L. earned Northern Athletic League MVP recognition and is among the leaders in the Northern Section in goals, points and assists. Senior Kendall N., Junior Emma N., and Sophomore Haley B. earned All-League recognition while Freshman Becca G. earned Honorable Mention. The U-Prep community is quite proud of the coaches, players and parents that made this season such a success. Go Panthers!



The varsity boys basketball team made school history in 2019 by capturing their first ever Northern Section title, as well as winning their first ever state playoff game. Coach Mark Stephens led the team to an impressive overall record of 26-7, while also capturing a share of the Northern Athletic League title, with a record of 9-1. Non-league highlights included wins over multiple upper-division teams, including a season-opening win over Enterprise. The boys were also extremely impressive in a one-point loss to Pleasant Valley. The Vikings captured the Northern Section Division 3 title, and have long been the class of our section. The section title game saw the Panthers dominate the West Valley Eagles en route to the school's first boys basketball championship. Days after capturing the section title, U-Prep earned a first-round state playoff victory versus Ripon High before coming up short against Will C. Wood High School in the 2nd round. While all-section awards have yet to be announced, the Panthers had a handful of players earn All-League. Seniors Mark S. and Kaden J., as well as Junior Logan H. and Sophomore Tanner S. earned all-league, while Junior Trevor J. was named Honorable Mention. Congratulations to the varsity team and coaches on an incredible season!





It was a season of pride for U-Prep's boys varsity soccer team. The earned a place at the state playoff game but were defeated 4-2 in a tale of two halves. The boys dominated the first half, but fell a bit short in the second half. The Panthers represented themselves as well as the school very well. This is the highest scoring boys team U-Prep has ever had! They are also the first boys soccer team to win a NAL league title and allow the least amount of goals in a season (less than one goal allowed in each game for the season). U-Prep had another great year at the Far Nor Cal Regional Science Bowl. All five U-Prep teams made it through the round robin portion of the competition with a high number of wins and made it into the elimination portion of the tournament. In middle school, we had a strong showing with losses only in the semifinals by our middle school B team and finals by our middle school A team. In high school, all three teams did well, taking up three of the eight slots in a competition with 20 high schools. Our high school C team lost to our high school B team in the quarter finals and our high school B team lost in a close match in the semi-finals. Our high school A team made to the finals and it was tied at the end of the first half, but in the 2nd half our team pulled ahead for a decisive victory and now will be heading to the National Science Bowl in Washing DC. This will be the sixth time in seven years U-Prep is going to Nationals.


### Who We Are Our Vision





SAT- The College Board website is where students register for the SAT. The SAT essay section is optional now. It's strongly recommended that students register for the SAT with Essay. This website also provides comprehensive information and a helpful action plan for students and parents. Students applying for admission at a four year university/college must take the SAT or ACT.

SAT Subject Tests- These are tests in specific subject areas taken separately from the SAT to help determine college acceptance (please check the admissions website). Starting fall 2012, the UC System no longer requires two SAT Subject Tests as part of the admissions requirement; however, for competitive campuses and majors, it's recommended students take at least two SAT Subject Tests in related subject areas. Most private colleges require at least two SAT Subject Tests.

ACT- The ACT website is where students register for the ACT. This website also provides helpful college exploration information. Important note: The ACT writing section is optional. It's strongly recommended that students take the optional writing section. If you choose to take the writing component, you must select the optional writing test when you register.

### **Exam Prep Like No Other!**

Exam Prep like no other! We will hold the Annual AP Retreat at Lassen Pines in Viola, CA—just north of Shingletown. The AP Retreat is an intense 2 1/2 days of content-specific AP Exam prep combined with study time, group session studying and team-building activities. The foundation of the retreat is a series of AP Exam review sessions led by U-Prep's AP instructors with a focus on one-on-one AP studying and preparation in small groups. Students will choose from a menu of AP review session options. Exam Review sessions will be individualized by course and may include development of course-specific study plans and unit-by-unit content review, practice exams, concept and vocabulary studying and review. One on one study time with each AP teacher in a smaller group setting will be provided. This opportunity is an excellent extension of the Advanced Placement courses we provide students.

The AP Retreat will be held from Wednesday May 1st through Friday May 3rd, except for freshmen who may attend May 1st—May 2nd, with a 4:00pm pick up time on May 2nd. All students will have bus transportation to the retreat at 9:00am May 1st, departing from U-Prep. This is an excellent opportunity for the AP students to have focused, academic study time for the AP test(s) which begin the following two weeks. Meals will be provided. The cost for the AP Retreat weekend is only \$130 for grade 10-12 students and \$95 for freshmen and includes: housing, transportation to the retreat, meals & snacks, Retreat t-shirt, AP Prep material and activities. ### **Dear AP Parents & Students**

We hope you are excited about the upcoming AP Retreat! We will begin accepting permission slips on a first-come, first-serve basis on Monday, February 25th to students taking two or more AP exams. For students taking only one AP exam, including freshmen, permission slips may be turned in beginning on March 6th.

Field trip permission slips, retreat course signups and payment (made payable to U-Prep) are due by the end of the school day April 3rd and should be turned into the ASB Office. Sessions for each AP exam will include more than one study session on multiple days to allow students a variety of subjects and to keep the prep classes small in size. There is a chance that study sessions will overlap, depending on the number of sessions a student signs up for, but AP teachers will work diligently to try and minimize conflicts.

We do welcome the freshmen students hoping to take a preparation session for the AP Human Geography test and we will provide these as an overnight and 1 1/2 day sessions to allow the freshmen to be with us to take part in study sessions and enjoy some time and food with the rest of the AP Retreat students.

Keep in mind that sign-ups are first come, first serve, as there is limited space at the site. Field trip permission slips are available from AP teachers and in the Counseling Office.



#### University Preparatory School Among the first to join the new College Board Pre-AP Program

New Pre-AP program offers instructional resources and classroom-based assessments to improve college readiness for all students

University Preparatory School was selected from over 1,000 schools worldwide that will participate in the new Pre-AP Program next school year. Pre-AP is designed to give all students the opportunity to learn the foundational knowledge and skills they need to be successful in Advanced Placement and other college-level coursework. The College Board selected University Preparatory School as a partner who is committed to college readiness for all students.

Participation in challenging coursework helps prepare students for success in high school and beyond. However, less than 50% of U.S. high school students are ready for college. And more than 300,000 high school students aren't taking AP courses and exams that they've demonstrated the potential to succeed on, based on their scores on an SAT Suite assessment. ### The Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments

The Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments are part of the state testing system called the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress or CAASPP.

The CAASPP System is designed to give information to teachers, students, and their families about what students know and are able to do and whether they are on track to be ready for success in college or career when they graduate from high school.



#### **Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments**

#### **WHO**

All students in grades 3–8, and grade 11.

#### WHAT

Tests students' knowledge and skills in English language arts/literacy (ELA) and mathematics.

#### WHEN

Each school selects its own testing window. Testing can begin as early as January and continue through the last day of school. You will receive additional information from your school about the specific dates and times of testing.

#### HOW

The Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments are computer adaptive. The online tests give students many different types of questions that allow them to interact with the test questions. For some of the math questions, for example, your child might be asked to drag and drop things from one place on the screen to another or draw a graph to solve a problem.

Computer-adaptive tests adjust the difficulty of the questions based on the answers that students give. As students answer questions correctly, they receive more challenging questions. Incorrect answers trigger easier questions. This helps keep the test short for many students and makes sure the scores are very accurate, especially for students who score very low or very high.

#### WHY

Test results are one piece of information about how your child is doing in school. Together with report cards and other information, test results tell us if your child is on track to succeed in higher grades and is ready for college and career.

For students in grade eleven, these results are used by some colleges in California to decide how ready students are for college-level classes.

A Parent Guide to Understanding the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments (continued)

#### Do students with disabilities take the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments?

Yes. Students with disabilities take the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessments, unless they have an active individualized education program (IEP) that designates an alternate assessment. The California Alternate Assessments for ELA and mathematics are administered to students with the most significant cognitive disabilities.

#### What resources are available for students?

All students have access to various accessibility resources they might need when taking the test, like a calculator on some math problems, a glossary when taking the reading part of the test, or a highlighter that they can use to highlight important parts of a long paragraph.

Students with disabilities have additional supports such as American Sign Language videos or braille. All of the accessibility resources help students gain fair access to the test and do not affect the students' scores in any way.

#### How can I help my child prepare for the test?

You are an important part of your child's education. Some things you can do to help your child are:

- Discuss the test with your child. Make sure they are not scared or anxious.
- Tell your child that you and their teacher have high expectations and that you are both there to help them every step of the way.
- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and a nutritious breakfast before testing.
- Review test results with your child and discuss with their teacher where they might need additional help.

# The English Language Proficiency Assessments for California (ELPAC)

The ELPAC is the test that is used to measure how well students in kindergarten through grade twelve understand English when it is not their primary language. The ELPAC is taking the place of the California English Language Development Test (CELDT). Information from the ELPAC helps your child's teacher provide support in the right areas.



#### The ELPAC has two parts:

#### Initial ELPAC

#### WHAT

The Initial ELPAC is used to identify a student as either an English learner who needs support to learn English, or as proficient in English.

#### WHO

Students take the Initial ELPAC if they have a primary language other than English, they have not taken the CELDT or ELPAC before, and they have not been classified before as an English learner.

#### WHEN

Students are given the Initial ELPAC within 30 days of when they enroll at school.

#### WHY

Identifying students who need help learning English is important so students can get the support they need to do well in school while receiving instruction in all school subjects.

#### **Summative ELPAC**

#### WHAT

The Summative ELPAC is used to measure the skills of English learners. The results will help tell the school or district if the student is ready to be reclassified as proficient in English.

#### WHO

The Summative ELPAC is given to students who are identified as English learners on the CELDT or the Initial ELPAC.

#### WHEN

Students who are English learners are given the Summative ELPAC every spring between February and May, until they are reclassified as proficient in English.

#### WHY

Students who are identified as English learners on the CELDT or Initial ELPAC will take the Summative ELPAC to measure their progress in learning English.

A Parent Guide to Understanding the ELPAC (continued)

#### The ELPAC tests four different areas:









#### Do students with disabilities take the ELPAC?

Yes, the ELPAC has been designed so students, including those with special needs, can participate in the test and demonstrate what they know and can do. As a result, the test includes accessibility resources that address visual, auditory, and physical access barriers—allowing virtually all students to demonstrate what they know and can do.

#### How can I help my child prepare for the test?

You are an important part of your child's education. Some things you can do to help your child are:

- Read to your child, or have your child read to you, on a regular basis.
- Use pictures and ask your child to tell you what he or she sees in the picture or what is happening in the picture.
- Provide your child with opportunities to use language outside of school.
- Talk with your child's teacher about your child's listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills to help support your child's progress.

### The California Science Test (CAST)

The California Science Test or CAST is part of the statewide assessment system called the California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress or CAASPP and will be operational in 2018–19.

The CAASPP System is designed to give information to teachers, students, and their families about what students know and are able to do. It also indicates whether they are on track to be ready for success in college or career when they graduate from high school.



#### **CAST**

#### WHAT

California has adopted science standards called the California Next Generation Science Standards (CA NGSS). These standards tell us what students should know and be able to do in science. The CA NGSS is designed to help students understand how science works in the natural world. They also help students learn the knowledge and skills they need for college and careers.

The CAST is aligned with the CA NGSS. The CAST will also test the student's ability to think critically and solve problems.

This new assessment uses questions that bring together science content, practices, and concepts. It also covers more than one science domain during the test, such as life science, earth and space science, and physical science.

#### WHO

All students in grades 5 and 8, and once in high school.

#### WHEN

Each school selects its own testing window. Testing can begin as early as January and continue through the last day of school. You will receive additional information from your school about the specific dates and times of testing.

#### HOW

The CAST is a computer-based test that has many different types of questions that allow students to interact with the test content in exciting new ways. For example, your child might be asked to write a short response, collect data, and analyze data from an experiment or other resources. Testing should take approximately two hours to complete.

#### WHY

Measures what students know and can do, fostering science education at every grade level.

A Parent Guide to Understanding the CAST (continued)

#### Do students with disabilities take the CAST?

Yes, unless the student's individualized education program designates an alternate assessment.

#### What resources are available for students?

All students have access to a variety of tools; for example, in grades 5, 8, and high school, students have access to a calculator, and in grade 8 and high school, students have access to reference sheets of constants and formulas and a periodic table.

Students with disabilities have additional supports such as American Sign Language videos or braille. All of the accessibility resources help students gain fair access to the test and do not affect the students' scores in any way.

#### How can I help my child prepare for the test?

You are an important part of your child's education. Some things you can do to help your child are:

- Discuss the test with your child. Make sure they are not scared or anxious.
- Tell your child that you and their teacher have high expectations and that you are both there to help them every step of the way.
- Make sure your child gets a good night's sleep and a nutritious breakfast before testing.

### The California Physical Fitness Test and FITNESSGRAM®

The Physical Fitness Test (PFT) is part of the state testing program. California has chosen the FITNESSGRAM® as the annual PFT for students in public schools.

The FITNESSGRAM® is a comprehensive health-related fitness test developed by The Cooper Institute.



#### Physical Fitness Test and FITNESSGRAM®

#### WHO

All students in grades five, seven, and nine are tested.

#### WHEN

The PFT is administered between February 1 and May 31. You will receive additional information from your school about the specific dates and times of testing.

#### WHAT

The FITNESSGRAM® has six fitness areas:

- Aerobic Capacity
- Body Composition
- Abdominal Strength and Endurance
- Trunk Extensor Strength and Flexibility
- Upper Body Strength and Endurance
- Flexibility

#### HOW

The PFT can be given to students over multiple days. Students will participate in each of the six fitness areas and will get a score in the Healthy Fitness Zone (HFZ) or in the Needs Improvement area.

### Do students with disabilities take the PFT?

Yes. Most of the fitness areas of the FITNESSGRAM® have two or three test options so all students, including those with special needs, have the chance to participate in the PFT. Students are to be given as much of the test as their condition will permit.

#### WHY

FITNESSGRAM® results are one measure of information students and their families may use, along with other information, to monitor overall fitness.

Schools may also use these results for the purpose of evaluating their physical education program.


