Liz graduated from University Preparatory School in 2017 and is currently in her senior year at University of California, Irvine, where she has been assisting with research on the brain, specifically neuroplasticity with the goal of helping stroke patients improve their lives. On April 1st, the day before Spring Break, students in physical science classes at U-Prep competed in the annual paper tower building contest. Students were attempting to build the highest freestanding tower by using a single sheet of printer paper and 50 centimeters of tape. In just 50 minutes, many students working either individually or in groups were able to build towers that were many times taller than the piece of paper they started out with. The overall winner junior, Olivia Crawford with a tower that was 175 centimeters tall (almost 5'9") which she built by herself while on Distance Learning. There were many other great towers in both high school and middle school. The tallest by 6th graders in Earth Science was a tower built by Wesley Anderson, Parks Weaver, Rielly Bennett, Alex Chavez, and Julian Turner at 128 cm and the tallest built by 8th graders in Physical Science was a 152 cm tall tower built by Camden Nash, Lyndsey Schuster, and Shayla Burton. 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

VARSITY BOYS SOCCER

The 2021 Varsity Boys soccer team began their year with high expectations. The team felt their prospects were good with seven returning seniors (plus two new recruits) playing alongside a strong supporting cast. Due to COVID-19 the season was pushed back several times, but the team kept their spirits and hopes up. Finally the day came and the season was approved! Day one of tryouts produced 24 players for an early 6:30 AM start. The team was fortunate to acquire two additional seniors due to the adjust sports seasons. When the season started the team took the field against last year's main rival, Anderson, who previously defeated U-Prep in three separate games by one goal. The U-Prep team decided to leave no doubt and took the first game of the season 5-1 setting a tone of "we are here to win". The combination of leadership and mentorship from the seniors shown towards the younger players created an effective collaboration for a winning team. They would as a team go on to be undefeated for the season, scoring an average of 3.5 goals per game. Two games were added at the end of their season vs. Division 1 opponents Chico and PV with U-Prep victorious. With a 5-2 dominating victory over Chico and then a 2-0 victory over a very physical PV team this year's team stepped into the history books as the only Boys soccer team in school history to ever beat both Chico and PV in the same year. It is a season to remember; one where the leadership of nine seniors guiding the younger players about what it takes to win at a high level. The future of U-Prep Boys soccer looks very bright.

TIME MANAGEMENT WORKSHEET

OVERVIEW

The Time Management Worksheet helps students consider how they will allocate their time for a particular semester/trimester/quarter. Students should estimate hours spent in a 7-day week across the following four categories:

School

The Time Management Worksheet works best when students know the homework load expectations for all of their classes. If this information is not already available to students, we recommend asking every department to complete the worksheet titled "Maximum Homework Estimates" (page 3 of this document). On it, departments can list all classes offered along with the maximum amount of nightly homework students can expect. Page 4 offers an example.

Extracurriculars

This section allows students to capture the structured activities they do outside of school such as sports, theatre, debate, paid work, community service, religious school, outside tutoring, etc. Students should not feel obligated to add an activity to every available line.

Unstructured Time

This section offers a place to list daily activities such as eating, grooming, and chores, as well as time spent outside of school in the following three categories:

Playtime - Time spent doing activities that the student freely chooses to do, such as shooting hoops, playing the piano for fun, hanging out with friends, or reading a book. This does not include scheduled practices or lessons that are captured in the extracurriculars section.

Downtime - Time spent relaxing, reflecting, or just "being."

Family Time - Time when the whole family is engaged in an activity such as eating meals, playing games, hiking, watching a movie, or participating in public service.

Keep in mind that research shows kids need Playtime, Downtime, Family Time (PDF) every day for healthy development. Check out PDF for Teens for tips on how to build more PDF into your week.

Sleep

According to experts, to lead healthy, balanced lives, high school students need 8-10 hours of sleep per night, and middle school students need 9-11 hours. We have pre-populated this worksheet with 9 hours per night. If a student's schedule does not allow for the recommended amount of sleep on most nights, students should consider adjusting their daily or weekly commitments to prioritize sleep.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA DENTAL SOCIETY WILL OFFER 10 SCHOLARSHIPS FOR ACCELERATED DA TRAINING PROGRAM STARTING SUMMER 2021

This six-month program is designed for people interested in a career in the dental field, but don't yet have any knowledge or experience of the profession. Total cost estimated at \$4,000; successful applicants will receive \$2,000 toward that total cost.

TRAINING WILL INCLUDE:

- Infection Control Certification
- . Basic Chairside Assisting
- · Dental Radiation Safety License
- Dental Materials
- Knowledge and Skills to Obtain an Entry Level Position

The didactic portion of the class will be a combination of pre-recorded podcast videos, worksheets, quizzes and exams to ensure the student has understood the material. Students will meet with instructors via Zoom once a week to review the course content and answer questions. In-person classes will be held once a month at a dental facility for hands-on lab and clinical instruction.

After completion of this course, students will need 15 months work experience and a certification in coronal polish to be eligible to take the CA Registered Dental Assistant certification examination.
