SCIENCE BOWL 2023

On March 4th, 2023, the FarNor Cal Regional Science Bowl competition was held for both Middle School and High School at Shasta College. There were 11 Middle Schools and 13 High Schools competing, all from the northernmost 10 counties of CA. U-Prep had 2 teams in the middle school competition and 3 teams at the high school level. The middle schools teams are coached by Mr. Morgan Peck, and the high school by Mr. Cory Poole and Mr. Matt Love.

After the morning round robin tournament, our middle schools were ranked 1st and 4th seeds (records of 6-0, and 4-2 respectively). The high schools ranked 1st, 6, and 8th seeds (6-0, 4-1-1, and 4-2 respectively). In the afternoon, the elimination rounds were held. U-Prep Middle School's A-Team defeated Sisson School in the Finals 100-30 to bring home the Regional Championship Banner (3rd time in 7 years). U-Prep High School's A-Team defeated Lassen 58-50 to bring home the Regional Championship Banner once again! The National competition is next, with U-Prep's two teams (and a coach from each) heading to Washington, D.C. April 27th to May 1st (all expenses provided by the US Department of Energy).





RECORD SEARCHLIGHT:

- Athlete of the Week:
- Khamron Price-Boys Basketball (Week of Feb. 27th). Price led the U-Prep boys basketball team to its deepest run in the state playoffs last week. Price scored 22 points against Weed on Feb. 28 in the CIF State Division V first round and 21 points against Cloverdale last Thursday in the quarterfinals. Price poured in 14 points in a tightly fought 61-58 loss to Ripon Christian in the semifinals last Saturday.
- Ally Littau-Girls Soccer (Week of Feb 27th). Littau maintained her team's early lead and led U-Prep 1-0 against Placer in the CIF NorCal State Division IV Regional first round on Feb. 28. Placer fired 19 shots but couldn't get a ball past Littau. Littau recorded eight saves.
- Owen Asbill-Snowboarding (Week of Feb 27th). Asbill won first place in men's snowboard giant slalom during the final races of the season at Mt. Shasta Ski Park on Feb. 27. Asbill won five of six races this year and qualified for the Five Star alpine races in Lake Tahoe, which begin on Wednesday. Asbill also qualified for United States of America Snowboarding and Freeski National Championships at Copper Mountain, Colorado.
- **JoAnna Warren**-Basketball (Week of Feb 20th). Warren scored 46 points against Pierce last Thursday in the CIF Northern Section Division IV semifinals. Both teams combined for 148 points on the night. Pierce would get the better of U-Prep, outlasting the Panthers 75-73 on the road to advance to the CIF Northern Section Division IV title game.
- Kennedy Russell and Reagan Russell-Wrestling (Week of Feb 20th). The Russell sisters became the first wrestlers from Shasta County to win the inaugural CIF Northern Section Girls Masters Wrestling Championships last Saturday at Chico High School. Kennedy won the 113-pound division, pinning Pleasant Valley freshman Shyla Hipsher and beating Live Oaks junior Sierrah Swanson via 16-0 technical fall.
- Reagan Russell-Wrestling (Week of Feb 13th). Russell proved why she is one of the top girls wrestlers in the North State. Russell pinned Live Oak sophomore Melissa Castro to win the 118-pound title at the CIF Northern Section Division II Championships at U-Prep. Russell is 26-0 this season entering the CIF Northern Section Masters Tournament at Chico High School on Saturday.




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
